Alderman O'Connor Pledges Support for NCP

Members of the Neighborhood Connection Project (NCP) met with Alderman O'Connor on Tuesday, August 16, to secure her support for the structural repairs necessary to make the Metra underpass on Lehigh safe.

"Yes you have my support," O'Connor stated. "You absolutely would have my support."

The alderman admitted she was familiar with the condition of the underpass as she and her crew spent a full day cleaning it during Memorial Day weekend. Forty bags of debris and trash were removed.

Money for structural repairs will not be available until 2012 according to Alderman O'Connor. The \$1.5 million each Ward receives from the Aldermanic "menu" funds to cover Ward expenses has already been allocated. TIF money is unavailable because there are no TIFs in the 41st Ward. The alderman said she would

investigate other funding sources and would report to the NCP Team.

The NCP provided Ms. O'Connor with a recent video depicting the disrepair at the underpass. She plans to use it when she talks with the City.

NCP members also asked for the Alderman's non-financial support for the NCP's beautification endeavor. She said that she was happy to see this kind of community involvement and would definitely lend her support.

The NCP Team previously had brought the condition of the underpass to former Alderman Doherty's and the City Department of Transportation's attention, yet saw no action towards making the necessary repairs.

The Gardening Corner

Wondering what to do now in the garden? Select and plant bulbs for spring or summer blooming? Pull warm weather crops and plant cool weather veggies? Collect seeds? Dig in compost? All these things are possibilities but the most essential activity when getting ready for winter is giving your garden a good grooming. Weeds may die when frost hits, but their seeds survive in the soil. So pull all you see and discard them in the compost or in landscape waste. Any plant you suspect might be diseased – those with spotted, black or withered leaves – should go in the landscape waste including diseased tree and shrub leaves. This will keep the disease from spreading to your compost and becoming a bigger problem next year. *Happy gardening!*

The ECA maintains the raised bed gardens, the Jinny Mose Triangle Garden and the land along the Metra tracks from Central to Ponchatrain. We also watch out for overgrown weeds in the trees and sidewalks lining our downtown area. Some of the beds have even been 'adopted' by neighboring businesses or homeowners.
